

- Decide which schools you wish to consider making an application for your child to attend.
- Research schools (Website, OFSTED reports, Data etc.)
- Visit the schools you prefer (prepare key questions you would like to know).
- SEND/EHCP arrange a time to talk to the SENDCo
- Check the admissions criteria for each school on your preference list.
- Decide in which order to place the schools on your preference list.
- Make the application before the closing date.



2026/27 Secondary School Transition Key Dates

September 1, 2025: Application process opens. October 31, 2025: Closing date for applications. March 2, 2026: National Offer Day for secondary school places.


Applications received after the deadline are considered late and will be processed after all on-time applications have been allocated.

- 90% of local families are usually successful in gaining a place at their first preference school.
- B&NES have now expanded the application to include 5
 preference. This does not reduce the chances of you being
 offered your first-choice school.





Equal preference in school admissions means that when allocating school places, each preference listed by a parent is given equal consideration, regardless of its order. This system ensures that a school doesn't know which preference it is for any given applicant, and that the order of preferences only becomes relevant if a child qualifies for multiple schools.

Here's a more detailed explanation:

•Equal Consideration:

•When a school reviews applications, it treats all preferences (first, second, third, etc.) equally. They don't prioritise based on the preference order.

•No Knowledge of Preference Order:

•Schools don't know if they are your first, second, or third choice during the initial assessment.

•Tie-breaker:

•The preference order only comes into play if a child qualifies for multiple schools. In that case, the higher preference school is allocated.

•Fairness:

•This system aims to be fair, ensuring that all preferences are given a fair chance of success, and that the allocation process is not biased by the order in which schools are listed.



Transition Process – Supported by Somerdale

- Somerdale has a good working relationship with all of the local feeder schools (Keynsham & Bath).
- Secondary schools will not discuss transition with Somerdale until the secondary school places are confirmed.
- Somerdale will work with each school discussing pupils needs (SLT, Year 6 teacher, SENDCo, Learning Mentor).



Transition Process – Supported by Somerdale

- Secondary school transition leads will visit the school and meet with the Y6 teacher & Somerdale Team. They will also meet with the children.
- Most secondary schools will offer transition events at their school. Some secondary schools run events at Somerdale.



Transition Process – Supported by Somerdale

 Enhanced transition will be discussed and provided for children if required.





What can you do to support getting your child ready for Secondary School?

- Support the Year 6 process there will be more home learning and higher expectations.
- Understand that the school's approach will be slightly more secondary in Year 6 – we are doing this for a reason.
- Talk positively and honestly with your children about secondary school – they are amazing places!
