


Key vocabulary

What was the Bristol Bus Boycott and why was it important?



Key knowledge:

1. **Civil rights** are the rights that protect our freedoms and ensure everyone is treated equally.
2. A **boycott** is when people decide not to use a service or buy something to show they want change.)
3. The Bristol Bus Boycott happened in **1963**. In the 1950s and early 1960s, the **Bristol Omnibus Company** didn't allow Black and Asian bus drivers or conductors to work for their company. People from different backgrounds, both Black and White, supported the boycott.
4. A group of local activists, including **Paul Stephenson** and **Roy Hackett**, decided to challenge this unfair rule.



5. On **28 August 1963**, the bus company agreed to change its rules and allow Black and Asian people to work on the buses
